

# **In Memory**

# **Edgar Brothers & Helen Young**

Shortly before The Harmony Grange Fair was to begin in 2020, we lost a member of our fair family that was a face of the Harmony Grange Fair. Edgar Brothers from

the famous chance booth succumbed to a long battle with cancer. Edgar likes to tell the story that one year he was asked to "temporarily" run the chances as Helen Weaver was expecting a baby around fair time and her and her husband Tom wouldn't be able to do it that year. Well, 50 years later he and

his wife Irene, were still running it "temporarily". Over the years as Edgar and Irene expanded the chance program, it became a family affair for the fair. The Brothers family and extended family looked forward each year to spending time together at the chance booth selling chances, filling out names on them and of course at the helm of it all was Edgar. He was often accused of only doing what he was best at while at the counter of the chance booth and that was....talking. He loved to visit with folks. Those that he knew as well as folks that were there perhaps for the first time to our fair. As evening approached on Saturday, Edgar would start giving me updates on the status of how many chances were left to sell. His goal each year was to sell out and most years accomplished that goal. When the band was done playing on Saturday night and they were just about done packing up, "Edgar's crew", would start hauling out chairs and a table and the chance cage/ wheel and get it all set up for the pulling of the names from the cage. There usually isn't a big crowd left to set and listen for their names to be pulled but those that do stay can attest to the next statement. The fair was never officially over on Saturday night until Edgar read the name of the last winner of the various prizes on display that week. Edgar would state with a grin on his face, and I'm paraphrasing here, "that's it folks for this year and one year from tonight, we'll do it all over again.' Well folks, we are doing it again this year! Irene and the remainder of his family are continuing the tradition of the chance booth!

Now in this past year we lost a member who for many years was a more behind the scenes person.

However, Helen Young and her husband Joe who past away several years ago were part of the original founders of our beloved Harmony Grange Fair. Helen and Joe both did behind the scenes work that often

was vital to the operation but just not visible to the public as to what all they did. One of the things they did that still lasts today is getting their children involved from early ages and today Janet is our secretary, Dorothy (Dot) is our canned goods department head and John works

the starting and stopping line for all of the pulls each night of the fair. The last years of Helen's participation at the fair could be seen manning the Grange Booth selling Grange Cookbooks and then as it began to expand, Harmony Grange Fair clothing apparel. Helen was the first person to receive the "Friend of the Fair" award that is presented from the PA Dept. of Agriculture in 2011. This award was created to recognize the hard work and dedication of an individual or group that has contributed to the success of his or her fair, by volunteering their time to their fair. Helen was 100 years old when she passed away last year.

So as you can see from these individuals who have gone on to our Maker, whether you are out front or behind the scenes working to provide an event each September for the community, they're biggest accomplishment for the fair was to involve their families who today continue to carry on the tradition of The Harmony Grange Fair.

I would like to take a moment in closing to offer our sincere condolences to all of those who indeed did lose someone to Covid. The events we have seen and experienced these past many months have been stressful and trying for everyone but especially to those who experienced the serious effects of the virus first-hand. #### **HARMONY GRANGE FAIR FAQs**

#### Q. How do I enter an exhibit?

**A.** Find the department, section and class which best describes your exhibit. Consult general rules for the fair and department rules for information and eligibility. Find the correct entry form in this book or download one from www.harmonygrangefair.org. Send the completed entry form to the appropriate address before pre-registration deadline of Wednesday, September 8, 2021.

The following information should be recorded on your entry form:

- Exhibitor name
- Address and phone number
- 4-H club or FFA chapter (if applicable)
- Department, section, class, and description of exhibit

#### For non-animal exhibits:

Preregistering your exhibit makes it easier for you at the Monday/Tuesday check-in. We are aware that an exhibit may be a no show on check-in day. We ask that you try to keep it to a minimum to avoid waste and duplication. Unregistered items are welcome but please be aware you may experience a delay in waiting for your tags to be printed out for the additional items.

#### Q. Where do I go on check-in day?

Animal Entries: Report to the barn where your animals will be penned or stalled. The superintendents will check in your animal. Have your CVI and registration papers ready upon animal arrival.

All other exhibits (non-animal): Report to the building where your exhibit will be displayed. Check-in is Monday from 2-8 PM and Tuesday 9 AM til Noon. Non-animal exhibits, go to the exhibit building (old church) with the exception of photography exhibits which all go into the back of Grange Hall building.

#### Q. How do I know if my exhibit was awarded a prize?

A. The buildings will be open when judging is completed for the day. Exhibits placing will have a ribbon or sticker displayed. Best of Show rosette winners will be placed in a Best of Show area.

#### Q. What will I win if I am awarded a prize?

A. If you are awarded a ribbon and placing, check in this book under the class to determine the premium amount. Premiums will only be paid to those number of placings listed under the class in this publication. Premiums will not be paid for champions, Best of Show and reserve champions. Checks should be available after 4 p.m. on Friday of fair week. Checks not picked up by 4 PM on Sunday, September 26 will be mailed to the exhibitor.

#### Q. When can I remove my exhibit?

A. All exhibits in the Grange Hall and Church building can be picked up on Sunday, September 26 from 2-4 p.m. To maintain an attractive display, perishable food items may be disposed of during the week at the discretion of fair management. The ribbons awarded will be saved for pick up at the exhibit area. Claim tickets must be given to the superintendent or an assistant in order to remove the exhibit.

All animal entries MUST be pre-registered! Deadline for pre-registration must be postmarked by Wednesday, September 8, 2021. Entries excluding livestock will be accepted Monday, September 20, from 2 p.m. till 8 p.m. and Tuesday, September 21, from 9 a.m. till Noon. Pre-registration for all exhibits is highly recommended. Livestock may be removed Saturday, September 25, after 10:00 p.m. All other entries will be released Sunday, September 26, from 2 p.m. till 4 p.m. Judging takes place Wednesday, September 22, 2021.

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Harmony Grange Fair.
- The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- 3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, and theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- 4. Entries will be made according to classification.
- 5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette. The fair reserves the RIGHT TO DETERMINE how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor in the same class, or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species.

THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of the award is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary of the fair or show; or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.

6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor TO PROPERLY NAME THE ARTICLE OR BREED OF LIVESTOCK he is entering. Any exhibit improperly entered will be disqualified to receive a premium, but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made for the second time.

- 7. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor. Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.
- 8. Superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. The fair reserves the right to remove any exhibit not worthy of viewing by the public.
- Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. Any such incidents must be reported to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Program for further review.
- 10. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the Superintendent of the department and fair management.
- 11. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.
- 12. DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other exhibitor may communicate with the judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges.
- 13. All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners for thirty (30) days or longer. Health papers are to be issued in the name of the exhibitor.
- 14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 15. Over fitting of cattle is discouraged. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- 16. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter in charge of owner or employee. The fair will have stand-by attendants available during the youth judging or showing if there is trouble with the animals.
- Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- Întoxication, disorderly conduct, gambling and lewd or obscene conduct is strictly prohibited.
- 19. No unauthorized peddling will be permitted on the grounds.
- 20. No person will be permitted to act as judge of any class in which he / she may be an exhibitor.

- 21. In all departments, blue ribbons shall represent first place; red, second; white, third; yellow, fourth; green, fifth.
- 22. On all fair parking areas, the Harmony Grange Fair and its officers or agents, will not be responsible for any accident, loss, theft, or damage. Park at your own risk.
- 23. The fair reserves the right to construct its own rules, regulations, and to decide arbitrarily all matters in regard to formulate and enforce special rules for any conditions that are not covered by the list of rules and regulations.
- 24. While it is the desire of the Association to pay all premiums in full, should any contingency arise by reason of unfavorable weather or any other unfavorable cause whereby the receipts of the Association are insufficient to do so, then in that event, the right is reserved to pay pro rata in all exhibition classes after deducting expenses and the amounts so paid shall discharge all obligations of the Association for the current year.
- 25. NO PETS ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS, EXCEPTION FOR SERVICE ANIMALS.

## LIVESTOCK HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

All animals admitted to the fair shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag, tattoo, brand or records of unique physical attributes. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes. Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease is apparent or if health certification or identification documentation is not acceptable. All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin. IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UN-LOADING. Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals do not use it! "'IMPORTANT!"" If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor. Deadline for entries is shown in this Premium list under each department. Exhibitors must agree to display their animals as directed by the superintendent and will accept the stalls assigned by him or her. # GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

#### a. Restraining Animals:

- Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
- II. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
- III. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
- IV. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.
- b.Handling: Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling.
- c. Bedding: All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
- d.Feeding & Water: Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to, meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
- **e. Transportation:** Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
- f. Blanket/Sweat Collars: Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.
- **g.Health:** It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

All mailed entries must be postmarked by Wednesday, September 8, 2021.

Entry tags will be returned by mail to those sending a SASE along with entries. All others will be at the fair office for pick up.

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2021 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
- 4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
  - · A USDA-issued metal ear tag; or

bred and owned by exhibitor

- · An ISO-compliant RFID tag; or
- A breed-registered tattoo or breed registered ear tag.

Out of State Cattle: In addition to the preceding rules out of state cattle owners must contact, Dr. Tony LaBarbera or Mr. Ron Miller at 717-772-2852 for Brucellosis and TB Testing Requirements **LACTATING ANIMALS:** Exhibitor with lactating animals may bring the animal on judging day to be judged then return the animal home after judging. Registering procedure will be required the same as all other animals.

- 2. If running antique & stock classes MUST have factory hitch & length.
- 3. Contest is open to farm tractors with rubber tires. No four wheel drives allowed. No dual tires, tires with studs or chains permitted.
- 4. Each tractor may be entered in no more than 2 classes and only once in each class.
- 5. Contestants will be drawn by lottery for pulling positions in each class.
- The Harmony Grange Fair will not be responsible for loss of property or for injury incurred to property or person at the pulls or related to them.

- No one other than driver permitted in vehicle while vehicle is pulling. No pit crew member permitted on track except to start vehicle and get it hooked to sled.

- 11. Vehicle and sled must remain in boundaries during pull. Any attempt to move sled is considered measurable.
- 12. Contestant must pull in assigned position and within 3 minutes of sled spotting. (Track official to determine position change if necessary.)
- 13. Entries close at start of class, unless due to traffic hold-up.
- 14. First puller is test puller with option to repull in 3rd position. All decisions on repull must be made before vehicle leaves track with judge's approval. Any disqualification on 1st pull bars 2nd attempt. During pull-off only one attempt is allowed to make measurable pull.

  - d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
  - e. Condition and maturity. Be sure exhibits are of high quality.
  - f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
  - g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have top (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stem.
- 3. Read premium material. Carefully follow all rules and regulations. If any entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.
