HARMONY GRANGE FAIR FAQs

Q. How do I enter an exhibit?

A. Find the department, section and class which best describes your exhibit. Consult [general rules](#) for the fair and [department rules](#) for information and eligibility. Find the correct entry form in this book or download one from www.harmonygrangefair.org. Send the completed entry form to the appropriate address before pre-registration deadline of Sunday, September 1, 2024.

The following information should be recorded on your entry form:

- Exhibitor name
- Address and phone number
- 4-H club or FFA chapter (if applicable)
- Department, section, class, and description of exhibit

For non-animal exhibits:

Preregistering your exhibit makes it easier for you at the Monday/Tuesday check-in. We are aware that an exhibit may be a no show on check-in day. We ask that you try to keep it to a minimum to avoid waste and duplication. Unregistered items are welcome but please be aware you may experience a delay in waiting for your tags to be printed out for the additional items.

Q. Where do I go on check-in day?

A. Animal Entries: Report to the barn where your animals will be penned or stalled. The superintendents will check in your animal. Have your CVI and registration papers ready upon animal arrival.

All other exhibits (non-animal): Report to the building where your exhibit will be displayed. Check-in is Monday from 2-8 PM and Tuesday 9 AM til Noon. Non-animal exhibits, go to the exhibit building (old church) with the exception of photography exhibits which all go into Photography-Art building.

Q. How do I know if my exhibit was awarded a prize?

A. The buildings will be open when judging is completed for the day. Exhibits placing will have a ribbon or sticker displayed. Best of Show rosette winners will be placed in a Best of Show area.

Q. What will I win if I am awarded a prize?

A. If you are awarded a ribbon and placing, check in this book under the class to determine the premium amount. Premiums will only be paid to those number of placings listed under the class in this publication. Premiums will not be paid for champions, Best of Show and reserve champions. Checks should be available after 4 p.m. on Friday of fair week. Checks not picked up by 4 PM on Sunday, September 22 will be mailed to the exhibitor.

Q. When can I remove my exhibit?

A. All exhibits in the Grange Hall and Church building can be picked up on Sunday, September 22 from 2-4 p.m. To maintain an attractive display, perishable food items may be disposed of during the week at the discretion of fair management. The ribbons awarded will be saved for pick up at the exhibit area. Claim tickets must be given to the superintendent or an assistant in order to remove the exhibit.

All animal entries MUST be pre-registered! **Deadline for pre-registration must be post-marked by Sunday, September 1, 2024.**

Entries excluding livestock will be accepted Monday, September 16, from 2 p.m. till 8 p.m. and Tuesday, September 17, from 9 a.m. till Noon. **Pre-registration for all exhibits is highly recommended.** Livestock may be removed Saturday, September 21, after 10:00 p.m. **All other entries will be released Sunday, September 22, from 2 p.m. till 4 p.m. Judging takes place Wednesday, September 18, 2024.**

GENERAL RULES

- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Harmony Grange Fair.
- The fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, and theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- Entries will be made according to classification.
- Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette. The fair reserves the RIGHT TO DETERMINE how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor in the same class, or, in the case of livestock, the same breed, and poultry, the same species. **THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL IN ALL CASES** except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion not discovered at the time of the award is proved. In such cases, the superintendent, manager, or secretary of the fair or show; or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision. The case may be appealed to the Fair management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor TO PROPERLY NAME THE ARTICLE OR BREED OF LIVESTOCK he is entering. Any exhibit improperly entered will be disqualified to receive a premium, but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made for the second time.
- All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor.** Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.
- Superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry, products, and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. The fair reserves the right to remove any exhibit not worthy of viewing by the public.
- Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. Any such incidents must be reported to the Pennsylvania Agricultural Fair Program for further review.
- No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair except by consent of the Superintendent of the department and fair management.
- Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge.
- DEPARTMENT SUPERINTENDENTS MAY ENTER EXHIBITS IN THEIR OWN DEPARTMENTS, but neither they nor any other exhibitor may communicate with the judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges.
- All livestock offered for premiums must have been the property of the owners for thirty (30) days or longer. **Health papers are to be issued in the name of the exhibitor.**
- Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position, if in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- Over fitting of cattle is discouraged. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition.
- When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter in charge of owner or employee. The fair will have stand-by attendants available during the youth judging or showing if there is trouble with the animals.
- Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- Intoxication, disorderly conduct, gambling and lewd or obscene conduct is strictly prohibited.
- No unauthorized peddling will be permitted on the grounds.
- No person will be permitted to act as judge of any class in which he / she may be an exhibitor.

- In all departments, blue ribbons shall represent first place; red, second; white, third; yellow, fourth.
- On all fair parking areas, the Harmony Grange Fair and its officers or agents, will not be responsible for any accident, loss, theft, or damage. Park at your own risk.
- The fair reserves the right to construct its own rules, regulations, and to decide arbitrarily all matters in regard to formulate and enforce special rules for any conditions that are not covered by the list of rules and regulations.
- While it is the desire of the Association to pay all premiums in full, should any contingency arise by reason of unfavorable weather or any other unfavorable cause whereby the receipts of the Association are insufficient to do so, then in that event, the right is reserved to pay pro rata in all exhibition classes after deducting expenses and the amounts so paid shall discharge all obligations of the Association for the current year.
- NO PETS ALLOWED ON FAIRGROUNDS, EXCEPTION FOR SERVICE ANIMALS.**

LIVESTOCK HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

All animals admitted to the fair shall be identified by a unique and permanent ear tag, tattoo, brand or records of unique physical attributes. Animals known to be infected with or exposed to any contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease, and animals restricted by quarantine may not be assembled for show purposes. Animals presented for exhibition will be subject to inspection by show officials and will be rejected if evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease is apparent or if health certification or identification documentation is not acceptable. All show animals should be held in isolation for at least 30 days after return to the herd of origin. **IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING.** Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat and dairy animals when fitting your animals for show. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat or milk. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat or dairy animals do not use it! **"IMPORTANT!"** If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics or any chemical from fitting products is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor. Deadline for entries is shown in this Premium list under each department. Exhibitors must agree to display their animals as directed by the superintendent and will accept the stalls assigned by him or her. GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.

a. Restraining Animals:

- Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
- Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
- Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
- Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.

b. Handling: Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling, than loud, rough handling.

c. Bedding: All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.

d. Feeding & Water: Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to, meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.

e. Transportation: Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.

f. Blanket/Sweat Collars: Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.

g. Health: It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

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IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL EXHIBITORS!

PLEASE take advantage of Pre-registration.

All mailed entries must be postmarked by Sunday, September 1, 2024.

Entry tags will be returned by mail to those sending a SASE along with entries. All others will be at the fair office for pick up.

Please make sure your entries are correct as the office will no longer make changes.

If there is a problem with an entry, we will contact you. *If you have any questions, just call us.*

All livestock must be pre-registered by Sunday, September 1, 2024.

1. A Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship (VCPR) is required of all livestock. Available from 4-H leaders or fair secretary.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA-issued metal ear tag; or
 - An ISO-compliant RFID tag; or
 - A breed-registered tattoo or breed registered ear tag.

Out of State Cattle: In addition to the preceding rules out of state cattle owners must contact, Dr. Tony LaBarbera or Mr. Ron Miller at 717-772-2852 for Brucellosis and TB Testing Requirements

LACTATING ANIMALS: Exhibitor with lactating animals may bring the animal on judging day to be judged then return the animal home after judging. Registering procedure will be required the same as all other animals.

 - Pick out a perfect specimen; then select others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens or varying maturities.
 - Protect from dirt, disease, infection and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
 - Condition and maturity. Be sure exhibits are of high quality.
 - Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
 - Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have top (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stem.
- Read premium material. Carefully follow all rules and regulations. If any entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.

- Each county/local fair is encouraged to conduct a 36th Annual Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest at their 2024 event. Listed below are the criteria which we would like each fair to use in their contest. The certified first place winner from each fair will then have the opportunity to enter an apple pie in the BLUE RIBBON APPLE PIE CONTEST at the 2025 PENNSYLVANIA FARM SHOW.

RULES for local Fair and the PA Farm Show contests are as follows:

1. Open to any individual **amateur** baker who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
2. Entrants may **NOT** have won 1st place in this Blue Ribbon Apple Pie contest at any other fair in 2024.
3. The Apple Pie, including fillings and crust, must be **made from scratch with edible ingredients**. No prepackaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.) Any decorations must just be edible.
4. Recipe **must include at least 60% apples in the filling**. It does not need to be a “traditional” two crusted apple pie and it can have a variety of fillings.
5. The entire pie must be submitted for judging in a food safe disposable pie pan. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
6. The recipe for the pie and pie crust must be submitted with the entry. It should be submitted on one side of 8 1/2” by 11” sheets of paper. The recipe must list all the ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. Entrant’s name, address and phone number must be printed on the **back side** of all the pages. (All recipes and pies will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
7. Refrigeration is **not** available at the Fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
8. Judging will be based on the following criteria:

Flavor.....	30 points
Filling: consistency, doneness, moistness & flavor.....	25 points
Crust: color, flavor, texture doneness.....	20 points
Overall Appearance	15 points
Creativity	10 points
TOTAL	100 Points

Creativity is essential to a varied competition. Do not limit your contest to a “traditional” two-crust apple pie. We are looking for a variety of fillings in the pies; the pie must include **at least 60% apples** in the filling.

Each Fair must submit the Contest Summary Report verifying the winning apple pie baker. This person will then be eligible to enter the state competition at the 2025 PA Farm Show and will receive the Official PA Farm Show Certification Entry Form directly from the PA Fairs Special Baking Contest Committee by December 2.

HOT STOCK CLASSES: This class is for tractors not conforming to the Stock Class rules. Classes will be G. 9500 #, H. 11500 # and I. 13500 #.
2. If running antique & stock classes - MUST have factory hitch & length.
3. Contest is open to farm tractors with rubber tires. No four wheel drives allowed. No dual tires, tires with studs or chains permitted.
4. Each tractor may be entered in no more than 2 classes and only once in each class.
5. Contestants will be drawn by lottery for pulling positions in each class.
6. The Harmony Grange Fair will not be responsible for loss of property or for injury incurred to property or person at the pulls or related to them.
7. All minors must have a written consent of parents or guardian to enter.
8. Violation of any rules shall constitute a disqualification.
9. **JUDGES DECISION FINAL IN ALL CASES. ANY ARGUMENT WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION AND IMMEDIATE EJECTION FROM THE PREMISES!**

SAFETY AND ELIGIBILITY OF TRACTOR

1. No pressurized tanks allowed except LP gas. No oxygen allowed.
2. Drawbar height will be 18 inches for Farm Stock Tractors & 20 inches for Hot Stock Tractors.
3. Drawbar will be checked by a member of the committee immediately prior to making a pull.
4. Tractors will be checked after the pull is made, if there is any question of rule violation. (Weight and drawbar height.)
5. Tractors will be weighed prior to making a pull, on portable scales on the grounds.
6. Following pulls, each tractor will be reweighed immediately.
7. There will be no leeway. Nothing over the weight of the class.
8. No tampering with hydraulic control of drawbar while pulling.
9. Once sled is in motion, front wheels must stabilize at no more than 18 to 20" off the ground.
10. Tractors must be fully intact to be eligible to pull.
11. Tractors must maintain clear access to hitch.
12. No tires larger than 20" in all classes.
13. Remote kill required in Hot Stock Farm Class. Driver may be asked to operate kill switch for proper operation.
14. Helmet required in Hot Stock Farm Class.

OPERATION OF CONTEST

1. Officials may run any combination of classes.
2. All sanctioned tractor pulls must use an authorized weight transfer device.
3. Use of torque converters, automatic shifts, etc. will be permitted during the pull.
4. Operators must remain in their seats during the pull and must have complete control of the tractor at all times.
5. All pulls must start with a tight hitch. No jerking permitted.
6. Tractors must be stopped immediately upon signal from the judge.
7. Tractors must be operated in a safe manner at all times.
8. Tractors and skids must remain within boundaries of the contest course during the pull or disqualification will result.
9. Only one pull will be allowed to each contestant per class unless a tie is declared.
10. The pull will be considered over when forward motion of load stops.
11. **NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PERMITTED ON PREMISES BY ANYONE! ANYONE FOUND WITH ALCOHOL IN THEIR POSSESSION BEFORE, DURING OR AFTER THE EVENT WILL BE DISQUALIFIED AND IMMEDIATELY EJECTED FROM THE PREMISES.**
12. No off-brand engines permitted.

13. Once the pull starts, no more entries will be accepted.
14. Contestants must be positioned to pull with 5 minutes of name being called.
15. If puller makes a wrong gear selection, as long as he stops before the sled reaches the 75-ft. marker, he may have one restart.
16. The judges shall hold hole digging to a minimum.

SAFETY PRACTICE TO BE ENFORCED

1. Keep in mind the safety of the crowd and yourself when operating your machine. All tractors equipped with PTO should have shield in place.
2. Only the operator on any tractor.
3. No sharp turns, excessive speed or other unsafe acts.
4. Re-fuel only cool engines.

GENERAL RULES

These rules apply to all vehicles in all classes.

Entry Fee: \$20.00 - Admits Driver and truck. Pit Pass \$15.00.

1. All classes require a minimum of 5 pullers. Officials may run any combination of classes.
2. **NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES PERMITTED ON PREMISES BY ANYONE! ANY CONTESTANT OR PIT CREW FOUND WITH ALCOHOL IN THEIR POSSESSION BEFORE, DURING OR AFTER THIS EVENT WILL BE DISQUALIFIED AND FORFEIT ANY PREMIUM OR PREMIUMS WON BY THE CREWS CONTESTANT OR THE CONTESTANT!!!**
3. Pulling or tow vehicles must be operated in a safe manner at all times.
4. All drivers must wear shirt, pants and shoes in competition. Seat belts are also recommended.
5. All weights must be securely fastened. No weights permitted in cab, under hood, no loose ballast or bags (unless confined in bed).
Any loss of weight is automatic termination of pull
6. Vehicle must start and stop on signal of track judge. No use of rear view mirror, (Pull considered over when forward motion stops.)
Violators will be disqualified.
7. All vehicles must weigh in and pass safety inspection. A 2 1/2 lb. minimum fire extinguisher required. (Track judge reserves right to reweigh any pulling vehicle.) ALL weights must be adjusted while on the scales.
8. No one is allowed on track except Track Officials, Judges and Contestants.
9. No one other than driver permitted in vehicle while vehicle is pulling. No pit crew member permitted on track except to start vehicle and get it hooked to sled.
10. Vehicle must start with tight hitch. No jerking or working of clutch after pull is started. Any violation will be disqualified.
11. Vehicle and sled must remain in boundaries during pull. Any attempt to move sled is considered measurable.
12. Contestant must pull in assigned position and within 3 minutes of sled spotting. (Track official to determine position change if necessary.)
13. Entries close at start of class, unless due to traffic hold-up.
14. First puller is test puller with option to repull in 3rd position. All decisions on repull must be made before vehicle leaves track with judge's approval. Any disqualification on 1st pull bars 2nd attempt. During pull-off only one attempt is allowed to make measurable pull.
15. **JUDGES DECISION FINAL IN ALL CASES. ANY ARGUMENT WILL RESULT IN DISQUALIFICATION AND IMMEDIATE EJECTION FROM THE PREMISES!**
16. Rain Out:
 - (A) During pull, any class not completed will be treated as a rain out. If class must be canceled after 2/3 of entries have pulled; purse for class must be paid.

10. No wider than 10 inch rim. Tread width not to exceed 12".
11. Engine must be same as manufactured chassis.

Premiums: 1st - \$100.00, 2nd - \$75.00, 3rd - \$50.00

All trucks competing in this class must:

- Be stock appearing and the floor in bed must be solid.
 - Be powered by the OEM diesel engine for the make and model year of the truck.
 - Must have current license, registration, inspection, and insurance card.
 - Must have factory manufactured wheel base
 - Must be available for under hood inspection.
1. Diesel fuel only in diesel trucks. (No water injection, alcohol, propane or nitrous. (Nitrous bottle must be removed, if so equipped)
 2. No studded, cut, or grooved tires or any other tires not intended for street use. No tire chains. Tires must have stamped D.O.T number on sidewall and be a maximum height of 35".
 3. All added weight must be placed inside of truck bed and secured to prevent weight from sliding around in truck bed. No weight brackets, boxes and hanging weights. NO weights allowed in cab.
 4. Original front and rear axles must be used: raising or lowering of truck height with suspension modifications is permitted.
 5. A fully functional front and rear suspension is required. No blocking suspension traction stabilizer bars, spring- clamps, or locking of springs is allowed.

 - Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
 - Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have top (leaves) removed leaving about two inches of stem.
- Read premium material. Carefully follow all rules and regulations. If any entry calls for five specimens, exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. Your exhibit will be disqualified for having a number of specimens other than that stipulated.

- The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, **must be made from scratch with edible ingredients.** No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). Any decorations must just be edible.
- At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- A PA Preferred® logo is not required** because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPApreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- Entry must be submitted for judging **on a food safe disposable setting.** (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product** (ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.)
- Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.

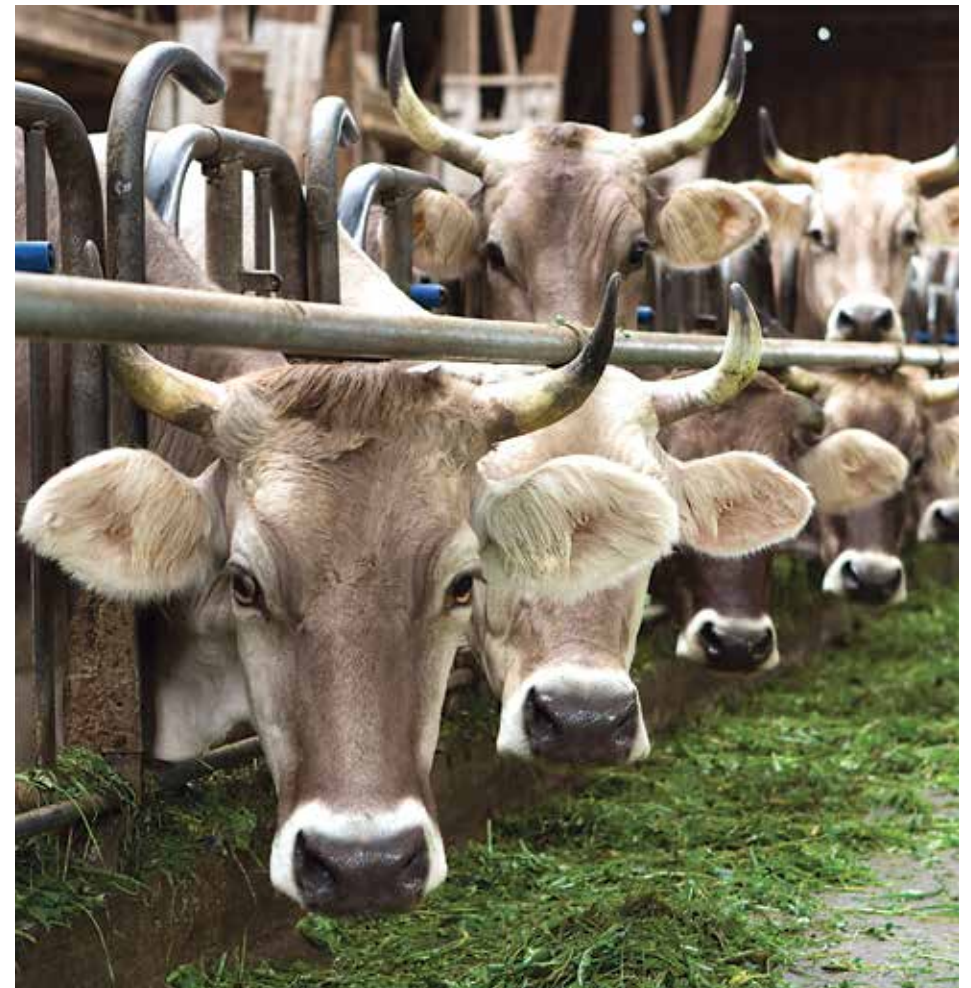
